Access 'Settings' at the top left of the main Google Scholar page.

It's the three lines that look like this:




Then click 'Library Links'.

Search for "Erikson Institute" and click SAVE.


STEP 2: Search for Articles

the first few words and possibly the author's last name if you know it.



STEP 3: Get the Article. Click Full-Text @ Erikson, then link to the resource in the next window
